Langston Hughes Biography

Born in Joplin, Missouri, James Langston Hughes was the great-great-grandson of Charles Henry Langston (brother of John Mercer Langston, the first Black American to be elected to public office) He attended Central High School in Cleveland, Ohio, where he began writing poetry in the eighth grade His
